They're available in two formats: text and portable document format (PDF).

To download a form:

Enter your email address into one (or more) of the fields below and click the "Receive My Free Download" button to receive the form listed above that field. The form will either open immediately from the link you receive or instruct you to save the file to your hard drive. You can also print forms by pulling down your File menu and selecting Print. *By entering your email, you will automatically be signed up to receive Family Tree's free email newsletters, plus updates and special offers from Family Tree and carefully selected partners.*

The text versions give you the basic form structure in files you can open in your word-processing software. You can print, edit or even type your information right in the file. The PDF versions are read-only files with snazzier designs—they're suitable for displaying or sharing your research with others.
